Hello to the Master Gardener Community from Dalhousie University!

Yes, it is official - as of September 1st, 2012, we are now the Faculty of Agriculture, Dalhousie University situated on the Dalhousie Agricultural Campus in Truro, NS. Go Tigers and Rams!

Change is sometimes а nerve - wracking experience, and we at Continuing Education must admit we approached the September 1st date with a bit of trepidation, but we are now two months in, and things are flowing fairly smoothly. New boss for us, but the same great program for all of our gardening enthusiasts!

I appreciate being asked by your president to be a regular contributor to your newsletter to offer the latest news from those who are running the Master Gardener educational programming. For this issue, I will offer some background to the program and some stats to those who may not be aware of its success.

launched in 2004 and has since shown tremendous growth.

The addition of the courses for the Master Training Gardeners of Ontario in 2007 was also a great success in terms of increasing student volume and institutional reach.

To date, the program has had a total of 1235

Online course registrations. The Atlantic stream has shown relatively steady enrollment annually, with October consistently showing the highest enrollment. The Ontario stream has shown consistent growth since 2007 and also shows October being the most popular intake. Since 2008, the number of students in the Ontario stream has outweighed that of those in the Atlantic stream, with the Atlantic student population being 64% of that of Ontario.

The number of graduates from the program is worth celebrating with a grand total of 162 at the end of the 2012 year. Students from this program are from across Canada, with graduates representing Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Ontario, and Alberta in attendance at last year's Master Gardener graduation ceremony. Thank you to all who have spread the good word about what we have to offer!

To help promote this wonderful program established a Master Gardener Training Bursary at the beginning of the 2011 academic year. Two \$300 bursaries are awarded to students in the program to provide incentive for further education in gardening. The Master Gardener Training program was To qualify, applicants must be currently enrolled or planning to enroll in one of the four online courses that are required for either the Master Gardener or Master Gardener Training Program certificates. Applications are due in the fall, and more information can be found on the Continuing Education website.

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

Restructuring The Fredericton Botanic Garden Daylily Bed

The Daylily Bed

This bed was fairly overgrown. It contained a tangle of roses and some Siberian iris as well as daylilies. To my surprise the planting contained 71 daylilies. At the time these were planted the name tags were planted with them. There was a planting plan at one time, but this was not to be found.

Where to start? We knew that most of the daylilies had come from purchases made from Red Lane Gardens in PEI. Because some were annual plant sale choices, there were photos of them and some descriptions. We waited until most were in bloom and then commenced the work.

The bed is roughly rectangular in size. I began the work with one of our student gardeners in mid July. First we divided the bed into six linear sections. Within the sections we assigned a number to each plant. She recorded the number system and the observations on the iPad while I was numbering and giving her the description of the cultivars, ie diploid or tetraploid, flower (spider form, recurved petals etc), colour(s), markings (chevrons, water marks etc.)

When this was done I started trying to identify the plants. There are well over 40,000 cultivars! Do you know how many pink daylilies there are? I found a few this way. Then we started back through PDf files of previous purchases. We had invoices and some PDfs for purchases made in 2009, 2008, 2007 and 2006. These yielded five of the plants we were searching for. Meanwhile I was putting some of the pictures on the FBG Facebook page. This really helped as one of our members also had some records. Turns out she had a PDf of the 2005 purchases. That was the answer. With this in hand the rest of the cultivars. (except for several which were not blooming) were identified. Some of the cultivars are Hemerocallis 'Willy Nilly', 'Too Marvellous', 'Endless Galmour', 'Final Touch', 'Justin June' and 'Camden Gold Dollar'.

Now what? Since most of these had been planted in 2005 many were overgrown, crowded and not looking their best. Knowing that many of these would be saleable in the Annual Sale, we proceeded to divide some cultivars and move the divisions to the propagation beds (about 5 dozen in all), some plants were also moved to areas of the Entrance Garden and the Resource Centre Garden that had been restructured. They can be harvested from there in future. Finally with the space gained, we moved many so that they would have a chance to flourish. The bed now contains

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about 43 plants. We arranged the replanting with an eye to colour and height. We should have a vibrant display next summer.

In total about 40 hours of effort with City staff, students, a volunteer, the author and member, Doug Dewar were required. There is now a planting plan of the restructured beds. Next spring plants will have name tags so that visitors may know the names of the plant or plants they are admiring. The planting plan and other supporting documents will become part of the permanent plant files of the FBG.

A project like this offers lots of learning opportunities. These include problem solving, structure and features of herbaceous perennials like daylilies, how and when to dig and divide large daylily clumps, and replanting techniques.

My Garden

This picture was taken on August 22, 2012. I particularly like this one as it shows the location of the garden. It faces northeast and gets sun for most of the day. In the early morning it is somewhat shaded by the birch tree but the afternoon sun plays a big part in the growth of the plants. The garden was started in 2010 when we moved to this location in Abercrombie. We are situated on the East River about three miles from New Glasgow, Nova Scotia and have a really nice view ofthe town of Pictou.

There had been a garden in this yard many years before but I wasn't sure of the exact location of it when we moved here. There was evidence of a few scattered plants but not much else. The yard was cleared and while the house was under construction I brought in many loads of top soil and compost from the local landfill site. Some kind friends gave me many plants and I hastily put them in this area.



The next fall, spring and summer I reorganized and tried to get some semblance of what I wanted it to look like. In the spring of 2011 I brought in the interlocking bricks and built a wall to enclose the plantings and give the garden some structure.

At the time these pictures were taken you can see there were many plants in bloom. The good soil and lots of sunlight from a great growing season made for very enjoyable gardening time.

Two obstacles I face in this location are limited watering, as we are on a well, and fire ants. The latter are a huge nuisance and I have been stung several times. Although the bites are uncomfortable they don't keep me from doing what I love to do. I have found some ways around their presence. One thing I do is wear long pants, long sleeved thirts and long gloves. This usually means working early in the morning before the heat of the day

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but that is fine with me. The best time of year is spring and fall when they are not so active. I really try to limit my spraying as it tends to take a lot of activity out of the garden.

This is the third year for the garden and it is still undergoing many changes. This fall I moved many of the plants out to another garden because the area was getting overgrown. As gardeners all know this is always a work in progress and we are never satisfied so who knows what next spring will bring and what will be blooming there next August?
